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#### **Directors' Report**

The directors of One Managed Investment Funds Limited (ABN 47 117 400 987) ("OMIFL" or the "Responsible Entity"), the Responsible Entity of Euree A-REIT Securities Fund (the "Fund"), submit their report together with the financial statements for the Fund for the year ended 30 June 2025.

## **Responsible Entity**

The responsible Entity of the Fund is OMIFL.

The registered office and principal place of business of the Responsible Entity is Level 16, Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrer Place, Sydney 2000.

#### **Investment Manager**

The Investment Manager of the Fund is Euree Asset Management Pty Ltd (ABN 40 665 390 241).

The principal place of business of the Investment Manager is Level 8, 525 Flinders Street, Melbourne VIC 3000.

# **Principal Activities**

The Fund is a registered managed investment scheme, under the Corporations Act and is structured as a unit trust. The Fund was constituted on 12 July 2023, registered on 24 July 2023 and commenced operations on 14 August 2023.

The principal activity of the Fund during the year was to invest in accordance with the provisions of the Fund's Constitution and its most recent offer document dated 11 August 2023 and the supplementary information memorandum dated 11 August 2023.

The Fund's investment objective is to invest in a diversified portfolio of ASX listed property securities to outperform the S&P 300 A-REIT Accumulation Index by 1.5% p.a. (after fees) over rolling 3-year periods.

# **Review of Operations**

#### Results

The results of the operations of the Fund are disclosed in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income of the financial statements. The profit attributable to unitholders for the period ended 30 June 2025 was \$540,431 (2024: \$443,516).

#### **Distributions**

In respect of the financial period ended 30 June 2025, a distribution of \$586,864 (2024: \$249,878) was declared and \$489,670 (2024: \$221,462) payable to unitholders as at 30 June 2025.

#### **Review of Operations (continued)**

#### Value of Assets and Units Issued

The total value of the Fund's assets at 30 June 2025 was \$5,121,663 (2024: \$5,505,470). The total number of units on issue as at 30 June 2025 was 4,181,405 (2024: 4,630,551).

# Material Changes in State of Affairs

There were no material changes in the state of affairs in the Fund during the financial period ended 30 June 2025.

#### Subsequent Events

There has been no matter or circumstances occurring subsequent to the end of the period that has materially affected, or may materially affect the operations of the Fund, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Fund in future financial years.

#### **Likely Developments and Expected Results of Operations**

The Fund will continue to be managed in accordance with the Constitution and investment objectives as detailed in its most recent Product Disclosure Statement dated 11 August 2023.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements

#### 1. General information

The Fund is registered as a managed investment scheme. The trustee of the Fund is One Managed Investment Funds Limited ("OMIFL" or the "Responsible Entity"). The registered office and principal place of business of the Trustee is Level 16, Governor Macquarie Tower, 1 Farrer Place, Sydney, NSW 2000.

The Fund was constituted on 12 July 2023, registered on 24 July 2023 and commenced operations on 14 August 2023.

The financial statements were authorised for issue by the directors on the date the Director's Declaration was signed. The directors of the Responsible Entity have the power to amend and reissue the financial statements. The principal activity of the Fund is disclosed in the Directors' Report.

#### 2. New or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations adopted

The Fund has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period. Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted.

The adoption of these Accounting Standards and Interpretations did not have any material impact on the financial performance or position of the Fund.

### 3. Material accounting policies

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below.

#### (a) Basis of preparation

These general purpose financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board (AASB) and the *Corporations Act 2001* in Australia. The Fund is a for-profit entity for the purpose of preparing the financial statements.

The financial statements are prepared on the basis of fair value measurement of assets and liabilities except where otherwise stated.

The statement of financial position is presented on a liquidity basis. Assets and liabilities are presented in decreasing order of liquidity and do not distinguish between current and non-current. All balances are expected to be recovered or settled within 12 months, except for investments in financial assets and liabilities and net assets attributable to unit holders.

The Fund manages financial assets at fair value through profit or loss based on the economic circumstances at any given point in time, as well as to meet any liquidity requirements. As such, it is expected that a portion of the portfolio will be realised within 12 months, however, an estimate of that amount cannot be determined as at reporting date.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

## 3. Material accounting policies (continued)

#### (a) Basis of preparation (continued)

In the case of net assets attributable to unit holders, the units are redeemable on demand at the unit holder's option. However, holders of these instruments typically retain them for the medium to long term. As such, the amount expected to be settled within 12 months cannot be reliably determined.

#### (i) Compliance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

The financial statements of the Fund also comply with IFRS as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board (IASB).

#### (b) Going concern basis

The financial report has been prepared on a going concern basis.

## (c) Revenue and income recognition

#### Revenue

Revenue is recognised and measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Fund and the revenue can be reliably measured. Changes in fair value of financial assets and liabilities are recognised in profit or loss in the period in which the changes occur.

#### **Distributions**

Distributions from investments are recognised when the right to receive the payment is established.

#### Dividends

Dividend income is recognised on the ex-dividend date.

#### Interest Income

Interest income is recognised as interest accrued using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

#### Other income

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

# (d) Expenses

All expenses, including Responsible Entity and Investment Manager fees, are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income on an accruals basis.

#### (e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at banks and cash balances held with financial institutions.

#### (f) Taxation

Under the current tax legislation, the Fund is not subject to income tax provided that the unitholders are presently entitled to the income of the Fund and that the Fund entirely distributes its taxable income.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

### 3. Material accounting policies (continued)

#### (g) Distributions

In accordance with the Product Disclosure Statement, the Fund intends to pay income distributions quarterly. An income distribution comprises the Investor's shares of any net income earned by the Fund and determined to be distributable by the Responsible Entity. Where a distribution is made, the entitlement to income in respect of the class for a distribution period is the entitlement of the class for the period divided by the number of units of the class on issue as at the relevant distribution date. Distributions will generally be paid within 20 Business Days after the end of the Distribution Period or when possible following the winding up of the Fund.

Distributable income includes capital gains arising from the disposal of investments. Unrealised gains or losses on investments that are recognised in the Statement of Profit or Loss and Other Comprehensive Income are not distributed until realised. Capital losses are not distributed to unitholders and are retained to be offset against future realised capital gains.

#### (h) Payables

Trade and other payables are recognised when the Fund becomes obliged to make future payments resulting from the purchase of goods and services.

#### (i) Due to/from broker

Amounts due to/from brokers represent receivables for securities sold and payables for securities purchased that have been contracted for but not yet delivered by period end. Trades are recorded on trade date, and are normally settled within 1 to 2 business days for the listed investments and up to 3 weeks for the unlisted investments. A provision for impairment of amounts due from brokers is established when there is objective evidence that the Fund will not be able to collect all amounts due from the relevant broker. Indicators that the amount due from brokers is impaired include significant difficulties of the broker, and the probability that the broker will enter into bankruptcy or financial reorganisation and default in payments.

#### (j) Receivables

Receivables may include amounts for dividends, interest, and securities sold where settlement has not yet occurred. Dividends are accrued when the right to receive payment is established. Interest is accrued in accordance with the method outlined in note 3(d). Amounts are generally received within 30 days of being recorded as receivables.

# (k) Applications and redemptions

Applications received for units in the Fund are recorded net of any entry fees payable prior to the issue of units in the Fund. Redemptions from the Fund are recorded gross of any exit fees payable after the cancellation of units redeemed.

#### (I) Net assets attributable to unitholders

Units are redeemable at the unitholders' option, however, applications and redemptions may be suspended by the Trustee if it is in the best interests of the unitholders.

The units can be put back to the Fund at any time for cash based on the redemption price. The fair value of redeemable units is measured at the redemption amount that is payable (based on the redemption unit price) at the end of the reporting period if unitholders exercised their right to redeem units in the Fund.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

## 3. Material accounting policies (continued)

#### (I) Net assets attributable to unitholders (continued)

Units are classified as equity when they satisfy the following criteria under AASB 132 Financial instruments: Presentation:

- the puttable financial instrument entitles the holder to a pro-rata share of net assets in the event of the Fund's liquidation
- the puttable financial instrument is in the class of instruments that is subordinate to all other classes of instruments and class features are identical
- the puttable financial instrument does not include any contractual obligations to deliver cash or another financial asset, or to exchange financial instruments with another entity under potentially unfavourable conditions to the Fund, and it is not a contract settled in the Fund's own equity instruments; and
- the total expected cash flows attributable to the puttable financial instrument over the life are based substantially on the profit or loss.

#### (m) Critical accounting judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

Management has adhered to the Fund's unit pricing policy which sets out the basis upon which the units of the Fund have been valued, a copy of which is available upon request.

In the application of the accounting policies, management is required to make judgments, estimates and assumptions about carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and various other factors that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstance, the results of which form the basis of making the judgments. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods. The assumptions and methods used in the determination of the value of investments are outlined in Note 4 of these financial statements.

#### (n) Goods and services tax ("GST")

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST except:

- where the amount of GST is not recoverable from the taxation authority, it is recognised as part of acquisition of an asset or part of an item of expense; or
- for receivables and payables which are recognised inclusive of GST.

The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the tax authority is included as part of receivables or payables. Cash flows are included in the Statement of Cash Flows on a gross basis. The GST component of cash flows arising from investing and financing activities which is recoverable from, or payable to, the taxation authority is classified as operating cash flows.

# 4. Financial Risk Management

The Fund's activities expose it to a variety of financial risks: market risk (including price risk and interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

The Fund's overall risk management program focuses on ensuring compliance with the Fund's Information Memorandum and seeks to maximise the returns derived for the level of risk to which the Fund is exposed. Financial risk management is carried out by the Investment Manager.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

#### 4. Financial Risk Management (continued)

#### (a) Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows will fluctuate due to changes in market variables such as interest rates, foreign exchange rates and equity prices liquidity. Market risk is managed and monitored on an ongoing basis by the Investment Manager.

# (i) Price risk

Price risk is the risk that the fair value of investments decreases as a result of changes in market prices (other than those arising from currency risk or interest rate risk), whether those changes are caused by factors specific to the individual stock or factors affecting all instruments in the market. Price risk is managed by monitoring compliance with established investment mandate limits. All securities present a risk of loss of capital. The maximum risk resulting from financial instruments is determined by the fair value of the financial instruments.

A sensitivity analysis was performed showing how the effect of a 10% increase and a 10% decrease in market prices would have increased/decreased the impact on operating profit/net assets attributable to unitholders as at 30 June 2025. The results of this analysis are disclosed in Note 13(b).

#### (ii) Currency risk

Currency risk arises as the value of monetary securities denominated in other currencies will fluctuate due to changes in exchange rates.

The Fund has no financial assets and liabilities denominated in other currencies and held nearly all its financial instruments in Australian dollars. Exposure to foreign exchange risk is considered to be nil and no sensitivity analysis was performed.

#### (iii) Cash flow and fair value interest risk

The Fund is exposed to cash flow interest risk on financial instruments with variable interest rates. The Fund's interest bearing financial assets expose it to risks associated with the effects of fluctuations in the prevailing levels of market interest rates on its Statement of Financial Position and cash flows. The risk is measured using sensitivity analysis.

The only financial asset held by the Fund subject to interest rate risk is cash and cash equivalents. The Fund has direct exposure to interest rate changes on the valuation and cash flows of its interest bearing assets and liabilities. However, it may also be indirectly affected by the impact of interest rate changes on the earnings of certain companies in which the Fund invests and impact on the valuation of certain assets that use interest rates as input in their valuation model. Therefore, the sensitivity analysis may not fully indicate the total effect on the Fund's net assets attributable to unitholders of future movements in interest rates.

Interest rate risk is the risk that the value of a financial instrument will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates.

There is no significant direct interest rate risk in the Fund as the Fund does not directly hold interest rate sensitive financial instruments. The interest rates on deposits at bank and on bank overdrafts are both referenced to RBA cash rate.

A sensitivity analysis was performed showing how the effect of a 25 basis point increase and a 25 basis point decrease in interest rates on cash and cash equivalents would have increased/decreased the impact on operating profit/net assets attributable to unitholders as at 30 June 2025. The results of this analysis are disclosed in Note 13(b).

### (b) Summarised sensitivity analysis

The reasonably possible movements in the risk variables have been determined based on management's best estimate, having regard to a number of factors, including historical levels of changes in interest rates, foreign exchange rates and historical market volatility. However, actual movements in the risk variables may be greater or less than anticipated due to a number of factors, including unusually large market shocks resulting from changes in the performance of and/or correlation between the performance of the economies, markets and securities in which the Fund invests. As a result, historic variations in risk variables should not be used to predict future variations in the risk variables.

#### (c) Credit risk

The Fund is exposed to credit risk, which is the risk that a counterparty will be unable to pay amounts in full when they fall due.

The main concentration of credit risk to which the Fund is exposed arises from cash and cash equivalents. Credit risk is mitigated on the basis that the Fund only holds cash with major Australian banks.

#### (d) Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Fund may not be able to generate sufficient cash resources to settle its obligations in full as they fall due or can only do so on terms that are materially disadvantageous.

The risk that an investment made by the Fund may not be easily converted into cash with little or no loss of capital and minimum delay. This may cause a delay or freeze in processing withdrawal requests.

The Fund is exposed to daily cash redemptions of its units. Its policy is therefore to hold investments that are traded in an active market and can be readily disposed.

The Fund's listed securities are considered readily realisable, as they are listed on the Australian Securities Exchange.

In order to manage the Fund's overall liquidity, the Responsible Entity has the discretion to reject an application for units and to defer or adjust redemption of units if the exercise of such discretion is in the best interests of unitholders. The Fund did not reject or withhold any redemption during the year ended 30 June 2025.

The table below analyses the Fund's non-derivative financial liabilities into relevant maturity groupings based on the remaining period at the end of the reporting period. The amounts in the table are the contractual undiscounted cash flows.

An active market is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

#### (ii) Fair value in an inactive or unquoted market (level 2 and level 3)

The fair value of financial assets and liabilities that are not traded in an active market is determined using valuation techniques. These include the use of recent arm's length market transactions, reference to the current fair value of a substantially similar other instrument, discounted cash flow techniques, option pricing models or any other valuation technique that provides a reliable estimate of prices obtained in actual market transactions.

Investments in unlisted unit trusts are recorded at the redemption value per unit as reported by the investment managers of such funds. # 7. Investment Manager Fees Paid and Payable

Investment management fees are the fees charged by the Investment Manager for managing the Fund investments. The Investment Manager charges 0.85% per annum (inclusive of GST and less any reduced input tax credits) of the net asset value of the Fund. The management fee is calculated daily and deducted from the assets of the Fund on the first day of each month. Indirect costs are deducted from the Fund's assets as and when incurred. The Investment Manager pays the expenses of the Fund (other than the extraordinary expenses) from the management fee. To the extent there is a shortfall to these expenses they will be paid by the Investment Manager. Extraordinary expenses are paid from the Fund assets as and when incurred.

For the financial year ended 30 June 2025, the management fees incurred by the Fund were \$46,043 (2024: \$18,735). The management fees payable at 30 June 2025 were \$3,617 (2024: \$3,844).
